Imitate the Stork (not the Ostrich)

Often when a child is born cards are sent picturing a stork. Why? The answer is that people have observed over thousands of years that young storks love their parents and parent storks love their young. The parent storks really do care for their young well. Anciently people called the stork 'pious' (and the ostrich 'impious'). The Hebrew word for 'stork' is *Chaciydah* meaning 'kind' and 'maternal'. The root Hebrew word *Chaciyd* can also be used of people. For example: *Chaciyd* is translated into 'faithful followers' in Psalm 30:4: 'Sing to the LORD, you faithful followers of his; give thanks to his holy name' New English Translation.

A wonderful bird is the pelican, its beak can hold more than its belly can!

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

Can You Explain the Ostrich?

'The ostrich flaps her wings grandly but has no true motherly love. She lays her eggs on top of the earth, to warm them in the dust. She forgets that someone may step on them and crush them, or the wild animals destroy them. She ignores her young as though they weren't her own and is unconcerned though they die, for God has deprived

her of wisdom. But whenever she jumps up to run, she passes the swiftest horse with its rider.'2

'Do you know how a hawk soars and spreads her wings to the south?'3





Can You Explain the Eagle?

'Is it at your command that the eagle rises high upon the cliffs to make her nest? She lives upon the cliffs, making her home in her mountain fortress. From there she spies her prey, from a very great distance. Her nestlings gulp down blood, for she goes wherever the slain are.'4

At the end of the Book of Job, God asks Job lots of questions, as well as the ones above. Job learns an important lesson here and replies to God: 'I am so insignificant. How can I answer you?'5

Be Environmentally Responsible



There are seven emblems of the Holy Spirit: Water: Ezekiel 36:25; John 3:5; 7:38-39. Fire: Matthew 3:11; Acts 2:3. Wind: Ezekiel 37:1-10. Oil: Isaiah 61:1; Hebrews 1:9. Seal: Ephesians 1:13; 4:30. Earnest: Ephesians 1:14. Dove: Matthew 3:16; Mark 1:10; Luke 3:22; John 1:32.

How Do Birds Migrate?

'The birds in the sky know the right times to do things. The storks, doves, swifts and thrushes know when it is time to migrate. But my people don't know what the Lord wants them to do!'

Jeremiah 8:7, International Children's Bible

The Artic Tern weighs about 4 ounces and yet flies over

24,000 miles from the Arctic to the Antarctic and back again every year! It's estimated an Artic Tern will fly over 1.4 million miles in his or her lifetime!

'A Million Canaries'

Sparrows have no colourful plumage. Sparrows have no musical song. Sparrows are common. In the market-place they were sold for next to nothing. Yet, if sparrows had feelings, they would not feel insignificant, have low self-esteem or inferiority complexes! In fact, they would feel very valued! Why? God actually remembers each one! 'Aren't five sparrows sold for two pennies? Yet not one of them is forgotten

before God.'¹ Not only does God remember every sparrow he is constantly aware of each one. 'What is the price of two sparrows — one copper coin? But not a single sparrow can fall to the ground without your Father knowing it.'². In most



translations of the Bible Luke 12:7 says something like: 'Don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows'. *The Message* Bible translates this verse: 'You're worth more than a million canaries'!

Singing

'Spring warblers are filling the forest with sweet arpeggios' Song of Songs 2:12, Message. Birds sing. We sing. One line in the hymn How Great Thou Art reads: 'And hear the birds sing sweetly in the trees'. Let one of your congregation leaders know if you would like to join your church choir, start a church choir, accompany the hymns or worship lead.



Lessons from Geese

When geese work together as a team the V formation allows them to fly about 70% further. Geese both lead and follow. This means the point goose is rotated so that no one bird becomes exhausted. The formation is not exclusive, stray or lost birds are always welcomed into it. If an elderly or sick bird cannot keep up and drops out of the formation, two stronger geese will go with it to help look after it. Geese are loyal and social birds; they mate for life and are very protective of



their mates and offspring. They 'honk' to encourage one other. Migration routes don't change, so every generation of geese share the same common purpose and direction.

'Before the Cock Crows Twice'



'Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the servant-girls of the high priest came by. When she saw Peter warming himself, she stared at him and said, "You also were with Jesus, the man from Nazareth." But he denied it, saying, "I do not know or understand what you are talking about." And he went out into the forecourt. Then the cock crowed. And the

servant-girl, on seeing him, began again to say to the bystanders, "This man is one of them." But again he denied it. Some time later: 'When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter . . . 'Feed my sheep'. Despite Peter's vehement rejection of Jesus, Jesus invited Peter to shepherd people. Think about this story.

Why is there a cockerel on top of many church spires in Europe? The cockerel reminds us of a profound lesson. The cockerel reminds us of God's amazing grace to Peter. The cockerel also reminds us of God's amazing grace to us.

'Like a bird who wanders from its nest, so is a person who wanders from his home.' This means it's risky for a bird to travel too far away from its territory. This principal applies to us too. It can be risky for us if we wander too far away, and too long away, from our family and/or friends and/or geographical area and/or natural aptitudes and/or spiritual home. Think of the prodigal son.³

'Don't bad-mouth your leaders, not even under your breath, And don't abuse your betters, even in the privacy of your home. Loose talk has a way of getting picked up and spread around. Little birds drop the crumbs of your gossip far and wide.'4
