
Arks, Boats, Rafts and Ships




The Ship Was in Danger of Breaking Apart














The Lord spoke his word to Jonah son of Amittai: "Get up, go to the great city of Nineveh and preach against it. I see the evil things they do." But Jonah got up to run away from the Lord. He went to the city of Joppa. There he found a ship that was going to the city of Tarshish. Jonah paid for the trip and went aboard. He wanted to go to Tarshish to run away from the Lord. Noah's Ark

'Make yourself an ark of gopher wood. Make rooms in the ark, and cover it with pitch inside and outside. This is how you are to make it: The ark will be 450 feet long, 75 feet wide, and 45 feet high. You



are to make a roof, finishing the sides of the ark to within eighteen inches of the roof. You are to put a door in the side of the ark. Make it with lower, middle, and upper decks. Understand that I am bringing a flood — floodwaters on the earth to destroy every creature under heaven with the breath of life in it. Everything on earth will perish. But I will establish my covenant with you, and you will enter the ark with your sons, your wife, and your sons' wives. You are also to bring into the ark two of all the living creatures, male and female, to keep them alive with you. Two of everything — from the birds according to their kinds, from the livestock according to their kinds, and from the animals that crawl on the ground according to their kinds — will come to you so that you can keep them alive. Take with you every kind of food that is eaten; gather it as food for you and for them. And Noah did this. He did everything that God had commanded him.'

The pictures above show the outside and part of the inside of a full-size replica of Noah's Ark built by Johan Huibers and his team. It can be seen in Dordrecht in the Netherlands. Some of the London congregation visited it in 2014.

The same Hebrew word *tebah* is used for both Noah's ark and Moses's ark.

Moses's Ark



'She saw that he was a beautiful child, she hid him three months. But when she could no longer hide him, she took an ark of bulrushes for him, daubed it with asphalt and pitch, put the child in it, and laid it in the reeds by the river's bank. And his sister stood afar off, to know what would be done to him. Then the daughter of Pharaoh came down to bathe at the river. Ships of the Desert?



'I saw three ships come sailing in, on Christmas day, on Christmas day, I saw three ships come sailing in on Christmas day in the morning.' The fifth verse of the carol continues: O, they sailed to Bethlehem, on Christmas day, O, they sailed to Bethlehem, on Christmas day in the



morning'. Question: What have 'ships' got to do with Christmas Day and Bethlehem? There are several possible answers. To me, the most likely explanation is that the 'ships' are probably referring to camels that brought the Wise Men from the East to Bethlehem. Camels are often referred to as 'ships of the desert'. This could be because they resemble a boat swaying when they walk. The camel moves both feet on one side of its body and then the other two on the opposite side, resulting in a rocking motion. Like ships, camels also carry a lot of 'cargo'. Another question: Why three? This is probably based on the assumption that there were three Wise Men. Actually, nobody knows how many Wise Men came from the East, the Bible does not say, all we know for sure is that there were three gifts. Of course, the Wise Men did not arrive in Bethlehem on 'Christmas Day in the morning', they came much later.



Sea of Galilee Boats

In 1986, when the Sea of Galilee waters receded in a drought, an ancient fishing boat from about the time of Jesus was found buried in mud on the north-west shore by two local fisherman Moshe and Yuval Lufan. Because the wood was extremely fragile, the boat was soaked in a wax bath for over 11 years (to replace the



water in the wood cells). The remains are now exhibited in a local museum (see picture

above). The boat has been dated to 40 BC (plus or minus 80 years) based on radio-carbon dating and 50 BC to AD 50 based on finds of pottery and nails in the boat. The boat was about 27 feet long and 7.5 feet wide. The boat was constructed primarily of cedar planks joined together by pegged mortice and tenon joints. The 'ribs' were made of oak.

It has a flat bottom which allowed it to get very close to the shore. The boat could have been sailed or rowed. It had a single square sail fitted to



a mast in the centre of the boat. Based on its size the boat would probably have had a crew of four rowers and a helmsman. It would have been steered by two steering oars. There was a storage area on the boat and a somewhat secluded area under the planks where the fisherman






identified in the hull indicating it was repaired many times and had a long working life over many decades. Several models and life-sized reconstructions can be seen locally (See three of the pictures in this paragraph). The Sea of Galilee boats played a large role in Jesus' life and ministry. They are mentioned about 50 times in the Gospels.

The Sea of Galilee, or *Kinneret* as it is called in Hebrew, is not a sea, but a large freshwater lake shaped like a harp. Its main source of freshwater is the River Jordan which flows from the north originating in the Mt Hermon area. The lake is about 13 miles long and 8 miles wide. It has a total area of about 64 square miles and a maximum depth of about 140ft. Its circumference is approximately 33 miles. It's the lowest freshwater lake on Earth at about 686ft below sea level.

The hills around Galilee, especially on the east side where they reach roughly 2,000 feet, are a source of cool, dry descending air whereas over the lake there's often warm, moist ascending air. This large difference in height between surrounding land and the lake can cause large temperature and pressure changes. Consequently, very strong winds can occasionally funnel down through the hills causing sudden storms.

Josephus mentions a gathering of 230 fishing boats on the lake on one occasion in the first century, so it is assumed

there may have been more than this in operation. One of the most important locations for fishermen was the town known as *Magdala* in Aramaic or *Taricheae* in Greek. The name *Taricheae* comes from the Greek verb 'to preserve by artificial means.' In Magdala fish were processed for selling and preserved using salt brought up from the Dead Sea region. Magdala was where Mary Magdalene lived.







The boat on the right is a modern Sea of Galilee tourist boat. The boat on the left shows a tour guide demonstrating how some of the disciples who were fishermen would have cast a net into the Sea of Galilee. My wife Jean and I were on this boat.



The Boat which was Made and Bought



Log Rafts

Anchors in ancient times were often made by making a hole in a heavy carved stone and then ramming a short beam into it (see left picture). The picture on the right shows an ancient Roman anchor.

Ancient Sea of Galilee Harbours

The diagram on the right shows the position and names of the harbours around the Sea of Galilee in the time of Jesus. They were plotted by fisherman, Mendel Nun, between 1989-1991 when there was a severe drought in Israel and the Sea of Galilee water levels

dropped considerably. Because of the drought ancient harbours were easier to find. The biggest harbour was probably at Capernaum where the remains of several jetties were discovered, the above picture shows where archaeologists believe they were.





King Solomon's Trading Ships
